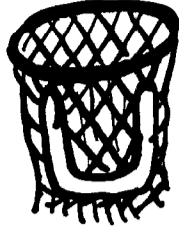
In the first game tonight, Mooresville takes on Monrovia.

The five U-school Semi finalists in the National Merit Scholarship Program have all been declared finalists in the competition. Steve Braden, Rick Darby, Carol Eddy, Sue Hendricks, and Susan Weisler will receive Certificates of Merit for their achievement in the program and will be eligible for scholarship awards made by the Corporation.

All five students are members of the National Honor Society and maintain an A or A-average. Steve serves as the president of NHS and vice-president of the French Club and also participates in Folk Song Club, Basketball, Student Council, and French National Honor Society. He has been accepted under the early decision plan at the University of Michigan and has designated this school as his first choice if he is granted a Merit Scholarship.

Rick, vice-president of the National Honor Society, is also a member of the Latin Honor Society, as well as Student Council, of which he is vice-president, U-Men, MYC, the Social Sciences Society, Math Club, and the Swimming team. Rick has not decided whether he will attend IU, Princeton, or Duke.

Carol holds membership in both the Latin and French National Honor Societies; Quill and Scroll national journalistic honorary; E. Wayne Gross; and Jordan Jesters. Accepted at Bryn Mawr College as an early decision applicant, she would apply any award from the Merit Corporation there.

Folk Song Club, and Jordan Jesters. Sue would use a Merit scholarship at Carleton College.
